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### General Information

### Access to Perisher Valley:

The Smiggin Holes barrier will be left open and unattended EXCEPT during the following periods,

- 1. Weekends (mid-day Friday to 6 p.m. Sunday)
- 2. Public Holidays, School Holidays.
- 3. Periods when bad weather, snow clearing activities, traffic congestion or other factors justify closure.

When the barrier is manned access to Perisher will be permitted only to authorised vehicles - these include - Shuttle Buses, Taxis (on prearranged trips), Trade vehicles on approved business. In each case written authority must be presented to the Ranger in charge of the barrier before proceeding to Perisher. Applications for Authority to travel past the barrier can be made at Park Headquarters or at the Smiggin Holes Ranger Station.

<u>During periods other than those described in 1, 2 and 3 above</u> vehicles may proceed beyond the barrier to load or unload passengers, luggage, etc., at marked Loading Zones in Perisher Valley.

## PARKING IN PERISHER VALLEY IS NOT PERMITTED

## Shuttle Bus:

The shuttle bus system will continue to operate between Sawpit Creek and Perisher Valley Terminals and timetables will be available shortly. We have heard that it will probably be similar to last season. Fares will be slightly higher. If you NEED a timetable we suggest you contact 'Cottrills' at 117 York St., Sydney telephone 29.7747.

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# Ski Lifts,

The number and placement of lifts in the Valley remain the same as last season. We have been told though, that the Chairlift has been strengthened to operate more efficiently (and more often we hope)

Prices of lift tickets have been increased slightly, Day tickets will be \$5.50 during the main season and slightly cheaper 'off season'. Cost of Ski lessons will also be slightly higher the basic block of five one-hour group lessons costing \$6.

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Set out below is the text of a letter received from the National Parks and Wildlife Service dated 11 December 1970. This letter reiterates the Service's attitude in respect of accommodation in Perisher Valley and the snowfields generally.

The Secretary Warrugang Ski Club Box 1075 G.P.O. Sydney.

Dear Sir,

The matter of overcrowding of lodges has been raised by the Department of Public Health and it has become necessary for the Service to rigidly enforce the conditions set down in your lease or subsequent correspondence related to the number of guests permissible in your lodge.

Inspections will therefore be made from time to time by Park officers or Department of Public Health staff and under no circumstances will accommodation be permitted either beyond the authorised number or in parts of the building not approved as sleeping areas.

These conditions will apply throughout the Kosciusko snowfields but we are particularly concerned about lodges, such as yours, which are using septic tanks and effluent trenches. It has been established that these do not function properly in alpine areas and in some cases they represent a definite health hazard.

Would you please bear this in mind when taking bookings for accommodation in future.

### WHAT PRICE SAFETY?

It would seem that a leg in plaster is the latest "in thing" for skiers. Hardly a day goes by without at least one broken leg on the slopes. It is almost incredible what people will do to be up with the latest fashion. Still, a white plaster on your leg is a little more permanent than the latest après ski gear. You cannot take a leg plaster off when you go to bed, as you can the other mod gear. But, as you may be in bed with your plaster for three to four months, I suppose it does not matter too much.

In the days of the old Kandahar (rigid) bindings and the fashionable "long thongs" (immortalised by Rajah-- 'My long thongs won't do up') one expected a leg or two to be sacrificed. But now the modern 'Safety Binding' should have put an end to leg fractures - it hasn't. Not because we haven't fitted them, nearly every pair of skis on the slopes is fitted with the owner's favourite brand of 'Safety Bindings'.

### THE FAULT LIES WITH THE SKIER - YOU AND ME !

Do YOU know how YOUR bindings work? Do you know how to check if they are working so that they release when necessary? Do you know how to adjust the release pressure so that they will work properly? Do you check your bindings regularly, preferably daily?

If you are honest with yourself and the answer to  $\underline{any}$  of the above questions is 'no', then you are a potential leg - in - plaster case. But you can avoid it.

FIRST. Constantly remind yourself that modern ski bindings are ADJUSTABLE. Furthermore, they are usually adjustable over a wide range from not holding the boot properly to a FULLY LOCKED position from which the boot will not release at all. This adjustment needs constant checking because it does not necessarily remain stable. Badly adjusted bindings or malfunctions due to lack of attention cause most broken legs.

SECOND. Learn how your bindings work when releasing. May sound elementary or unnecessary but one of our club members thought his bindings were broken when the toe piece swivelled apart. He proceeded to hammer it back together and locked the screw up tight. Fact, not fiction.

THIRD. Learn HOW TO CHECK if your bindings are working properly. Even when adjusted they may not release due to damage, neglect or some other cause. 'Step in' bindings are particularly prone to malfunction if snow is lodged inside the heel piece or left on your boot when stepping into the binding.

FOURTH. Do not rely on others! They are your bindings and your legs. Learn to adjust both boot fit and release pressure of toe and heel bindings yourself.

FIFTH. Check your bindings regularly. This should include checks to see that they operate correctly and wll1 release when the necessary pressure is brought to bear. Daily is not too often to check your bindings - but weekly is not often enough. Take a tip from Jurgen (Jack) Manthey who says "Surely a five minute check every morning is better than a five months stint in hospital".

While on the subject of safety here are some facts supplied by Perisher Ski Patrol President Bert Gardiner:-

Last season (1970) 244 rescues recorded.


This season in first month -164 rescues recorded including- 93 lower leg problems

- ON THE LIGHTER SIDE -



Dear Club Members,

It is nice to be able to say a small hello from Denmark, sunny Denmark as it happens and has been since early May until now. As you are all probably aware, Denmark has little skiing potential, since the highest hill in the country is well under 1000 feet. Nevertheless it gets pretty cold at times and just after we arrived in February, it got down to 11 degrees Fahrenheit. Some years it snows quite heavily and lies about for some weeks. Living about 50 kilometres north of Copenhagen and in the country, we do have some possibilities for langlaufing in the very extensive woods nearby. Ice skating is much pursued by children of all ages up to 60 and for the more daring (or foolhardy) a nearby lake provides opportunities for ice yachting.

Whilst living so close to some of the worlds top ski resorts they are surprisingly inaccessible. Certainly it isn't a case of ringing up booking and jumping in the car for a weekends skiing. Norway our closest resort is either an overnight boat trip and then train from Oslo or across the ferry to Sweden and then a jolly long drive. We haven't really explored the Swedish possibilities but we believe there are resorts outside Stockholm. So you see Australia whilst having a fairly limited season, is a 'lucky country' from an accessibility viewpoint.

There seems to be a good range of equipment in the stores although we arrived at the tail end of the last ski season in Europe. We realise too that being a member of EFTA together with Austria and Norway there are at least no tariff loadings before the government here gets at the price.

One of the more interesting things about the skiing in Europe is the multitude of package deals that are available. If one goes at a time when it is off-peak, the offers are quite exceptional. Most include full board accommodation and instruction. We hope to go on something like this about January.

We will send a message from time to time especially if we visit resorts here, so that intending visitors to Europe can perhaps put them on their visiting list.

### KOSCIUSKO HUTS ASSOCIATION

At first they were the 'lunatic' fringe, when they were held in some awe as they discussed slopes which none of us had ever heard of, and then the few grew into many. And ski-touring had been born.

Unfortunately the growth in ski-touring brought with it the usual growing pains. For instance there was a time when you could be fairly confident of going out on to the main range and not seeing anybody for at least two or three days. Not so now, although the slopes are still far from what could be crowded or even tracked. Along with the rapid increase in skiers there has been a steady increase in fishermen and bushwalkers.

Still the great majority of ski-tourers tend to head for the huts at night, and although there are something like 100 huts in this largest national park in Australia, there are now nights in these huts when they tend to resemble Wynyard station at rush hour.

Many of the huts in the best touring country have been there for at least thirty or forty years as either stockman's or gold fossickers huts. Now that climate is not exactly kind to wood and unpainted galvanised iron and once the snow leases were withdrawn they started to collapse fairly rapidly. There were a few keen tourers and fishermen who got together to ensure that their own special hut did not fall down but most of the others gradually collapsed. Late last year a group of fishermen, ski-tourers and bushwalkers got together with the park rangers to discuss the problem of too many people, too few huts spread over too big an area.

The result, the Kosciusko Huts Association. The foundation President is Robin Miller a well-known Canberra cross-country man. At the first Kosciusko Huts Association meeting at Sawpit Creek, Miller said 'basically we decided that if the huts were to remain and if tourers were to be able to use them then some organisation was needed. The Park authorities were becoming worried, and rightly so, that the huts would deteriorate into a collection of ruins surrounded by a heap of rusting tin cans. The association hopes to be able to organise the summer maintenance and with the Park authorities develop a policy so that basic weatherproof huts can be used by all the groups that are interested in the wilderness areas. You see it's not only loner types like ski-tourers and fishermen that are using these huts but large groups of boy scouts and schoolboys. Now it's hoping that the people that use the huts will not object to the payment of a small fee for a nights accommodation. It has been suggested that fifty cents per night be donated to the association via the Ranger headquarters at Sawpit Creek. This money to be used to provide a basic simple but adequately equipped hut, one with bed, warmth, cooking facilities and emergency medical equipment.
