

PAST DIRECTORS

Rather belatedly Warrugang News Magazine gives tribute to two of its past Directors - Ken Wood and Bob Neil. Ken has gone to Brisbane to live and Bob to Helsinge (Denmark). Their inability to accept nomination for the 1971 Board of Directors is obvious. The Board will miss them both, and are sure that all members will join with them in wishing both Ken and Bob every happiness in their new positions and homes.

KEN WOOD

Ken joined the old (unincorporated) Warrugang Ski Club on 20th September 1954. The old Club was incorporated into the present Company Warrugang Ski Club Limited on 23rd December 1954. Records start with the Inaugural Directors Meeting of 8th February 1955. Officially I can only give an account of Ken's contribution to the club from that date. However the early members of the club give testimony to Ken's interest and enthusiasm from his earliest contact with the Club.

First elected to the Board of Directors by ballot on 12th December 1958, Ken held a series of responsible positions on the Board. He was appointed Building Supervisor (14/12/58), Treasurer (30/11/59), Vice President and Treasurer (15/3/62). On 20/3/63 Ken was appointed President of the Club and retained this office until 29/4/69. He remained a Director until he retired at the beginning of 1971.

Ken's record term of 13 years on the Board with 6 of them as President only tell part of the story. Few of us would be privileged to know all the many contributions Ken made to Warrugang and indeed, skiing in general. He saw the Club grow from its earliest foundations, the additions of electricity (replacing our own generator), water (replacing our own dam), improved accommodation, introduction of catering management and was even present during our fire at Easter 1970.

Always a strong supporter of skiing, Ken has taken a leading role in the Perisher Ski Association for many years. Starting as our Club delegate Ken rose to the position of Secretary which he held until his recent move to Brisbane. He has seen all the problems associated with the Perisher Valley Development and been active in gaining recognition and consideration for all Ski Clubs.

Space does not permit a fuller account of what Ken has contributed. Older members will remember the delicate nature of negotiations with Ski Sports over booking money (in 1962), negotiations with the then K.S.P.T. and Minister for Lands over our lease, and many other situations Ken has helped guide to satisfactory results for Warrugang.

Ken, we say thank you for your conscientious and devoted contributions to the development of Warrugang.

PAST DIRECTORS

BOB NEIL

Bob joined the Club on the 18th May 1960. From the very beginning he was an ardent and enthusiastic supporter of all things pertaining to the Club and Club life.

He was not a seeker after the limelight. Bob preferred to display his support and enthusiasm just as a staunch member of the Club. He contributed regularly to Warrugang News Magazine. His articles varied from delightful renditions of his skiing holidays to provocative articles aimed at stirring Club members out of their apathy. Bob also wrote in wider vein about Perisher Valley matters. One stirring article on safety was subsequently reprinted in 'Ski Australia' - it was so highly thought of by the Editorial staff.

Easter work parties invariably included Bob as an initiator and group leader. Many mundane things could be mentioned but the most lasting of Bob's work party achievements was the stone wall round the oil tanks and along the rear of the Lodge. Less determined people would have stopped part way. Bob's determination, encouragement and example kept his happy assistants at the task until it was completed.

A keen racer, Bob was always available to help set or stamp courses for the weekly races. He encouraged participation by all Lodge residents.

Above all else Bob put the Club first and many will testify to this. A stickler for fair play he was not afraid to speak out when the need arose.

Bob's keenness and enthusiasm were noticed from the very beginning. However it was not until March 1968 that Bob was finally persuaded to join the Board of Directors. He continued his unselfish contributions to the Club's progress. Needless to say Bob was a willing worker and always ready to assist with the load of work that the Board has to perform.

Bob will be sadly missed from the Board and from the Club. His new home in Denmark is too far away for us to expect to see Bob at Warrugang too often. However he will be pleased to see any Warrugang member who should journey to his side of the world.

To Bob and Lillian, we thank you for all you have done - for your inspiration, for your hard work. The Board of Directors and the members all wish you every success and happiness in your new life.



Edited Transcript



LODGE ALTERATIONS

On the 18th/19th March and again on 8th/9th April, Directors visited Perisher Valley for the purpose of inspecting the work carried out on the Lodge.

We found the work well in hand.

The Lodge now has a very distinctive appearance, the roof line has been extended with the rear section falling away at a greater angle than the front. This gives a good outline from all aspects. The appearance is also enhanced by the enlarged annexe off the kitchen, this measures 8' by 14' with walls extending to the same height as the rest of the building. This section has two sets of double windows facing the road and a roof line complementing the main roof.

Exterior cladding has been renewed along the kitchen wall around the back of the Lodge to the end of what was the Men's dormitory. Internal stairs and Fire Escape stairs are in position. The new rooms upstairs have the floors down and walls are framed in position, their shower floors have been laid and plumbing is in place. All the old plumbing that was in the ceiling has been renewed and relocated to provide better pressure throughout the Lodge and easier access for maintenance. The Electrician has wired to new points and renewed old wires where necessary. Downstairs the dormitories have been remodelled to become rooms, and the drying room has been enlarged by removing the wall to the small storeroom.

During the visit on 18th/19th March we took the opportunity to clear out debris from the ceiling area and replace insulation bats to best advantage. On this visit we also conferred With the Architect, Builder and Plumber making minor alterations to plan to make the Lodge more comfortable and workable. The woodheap area was excavated and sloped away from the Lodge on 8th/9th April so that run-off water will not cause problems. Thanks Bram and Jim. It might be pertinent to mention that some aspects of our renovations are necessary to comply with local building regulations and to meet the demands of the 'Flower People' (NPWS).

Other visits will of course be made to the Lodge as building progresses and we will have further reports in future issues.

AMBULANCE INSURANCE

The cost of Ambulance Insurance for the 1972 season has been raised to \$1 per person per week. Directors have decided to subsidise payment of this fee to the extent of 50c for all persons staying in the Lodge. Remember, as a guest of Warrugang Lodge you are automatically covered for this Insurance. We ask you to contribute the remaining 50c fee when asked to do so by the Lodge Manager.

This Insurance covers the transport of injured skiers to Cooma Hospital when necessary. Normal cost of this service to non participants of the scheme is \$86.

OFF SEASON CATERING

Jurgen and Leslie ARE available to cater off season. This must be a mutual agreement between the parties involved and prices may or may not be comparable with those currently in force during the season. We suggest that those interested contact Jurgen or Leslie before their intended stay at the Lodge.

NEW SEASON SKIS

Are you in the market for a new pair of skis this season? Contact Tony Wilkinson, a friend of his is agent for a new import 'Schwendener' skis. Never heard of them? Well, Tony tells me they are new to the Australian market but are from the largest Swiss manufacturer of skis. They compare very favourably with other top grade skis previously available and prices range from \$100 to \$160. There are six types of ski to suit the most discerning buyer.

VALLEY TERMINALS

They are all gone except for No. 1 in centre valley. We are now over snow commuters. This action MAY make it easier for the Bus Company, the over snow contractor and people who normally join buses at No. 1, BUT WHAT ABOUT US, all the Lodges in our section of the valley? We were not asked to voice an opinion on this matter or given any prior notice. I wonder how many police will be needed to control queues? Well, forewarned is forearmed they say, so be prepared.

CHEAP AIR FARES

For what it is worth Airlines of New South Wales offer the following OFF PEAK concession fares to Cooma. Period July 1st to September 24th.

OFF PEAK FLIGHTS

- (a) All flights scheduled to leave Sydney for Cooma <u>AFTER</u> 1300 hours on Saturdays and Sundays.
- (b) All flights scheduled to leave Cooma for Sydney <u>BEFORE</u> 1300 hours on Saturdays and Sundays.

The fare on these flights will be \$8.95 single and applies to all adults, students and children.

This information came to our notice recently and is offered to members in the hope that someone may benefit thereby. A close look at the flights offered would seem to preclude ardent skiers, unless they were going for an extended period, then the loss of two days skiing would not be a handicap. Normal single fare is currently \$17.90.

SCUTTLEBUTT FROM THE COMPANY

We have been told by Stan McGuinn that prices in the Valley this season will be much the same as 1971.

Day Tickets \$5.50, Strip tickets will now only give 6 rides for \$2 The Company plans to introduce period tickets during the package deal off peak season. These will cost \$26 for 6 days all lifts and \$30 for 7 days all lifts. Price also includes 5 days class lessons if required, but no rebate is available if lessons are not taken. The idea apparently is that most people in package deal period take lessons. By doing a little arithmetic though it is obvious that there is still a saving on Day ticket prices. Lets hope this system is extended to full season in the near future.

Work has been done on the Chair Lift, capacity has been increased 20% by the addition of more chairs and it is hoped that permission will be given for an increase in speed by a further 20%. Overall effect hoped for is a 30% increase in efficiency. If the Department of Labour and Industry approve trip bottom to top can be speeded up to take $8\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. Ejector type chairs will NOT be provided.

SCUTTLEBUTT FROM THE COMPANY (Continued)

Another 'Ratrack' has been purchased to groom slopes and snow making equipment between No. 1 lift and the duplex lift has been extended to ensure good cover in this area at all times.

By 1973 season it is hoped to have a lift in the area of Back Perisher probably starting in Sun Valley. This project has been under way for some time now and latest feasibility studies have been promising.

Negotiations are reaching finality for a Weather Station in Perisher Valley, it is hoped that the Station will be established for 1972 season, giving reports to newspapers only for the first season. Telephone weather reports should follow by 1973 season.

SKI PROFICIENCY TESTS

The Australian National Ski Federation and Ski Council of New South Wales revised ski tests last year and prepared the following list of tests.

A.N.S.F. Preliminary Test

- 1. Herringbone, sidestepping, and kick turns to left and right.
- 2. Snowplough and snowplough turn to left and right.
- 3. Stem turn to left and right.
- 4. Sideslipping facing left and right.
- 5. A no-fall descent of 100 yards over slopes with an average slope of not less than 10°.

A.N.S.F. 3rd Class Test

- 1. A series of linked stem christie turns on a slope of not less than 18°
- 2. A stop christie to left and right at moderate speed.
- 3. Sideslipping forwards and sidewards facing left and right.
- Two, no-fall, timed descents of 400 vertical feet over slopes of up to 27°. The time of the descent shall be 5-7 minutes per 1000 vertical feet depending on snow conditions.

A.N.S.F. 2nd Class Test

- 1. A series of linked parallel turns on a slope of not less than 27°.
- 2. A stop christie to left and right at high speed from a direct descent.
- 3. Jump turns to the left and right in soft snow on a slope of 18°.
- Two, no-fall, timed descents of 600 vertical feet over slopes of 27°, the time of the descent shall be two to three minutes per 1000 feet depending on snow conditions.


