A SKI TRIP TO CANADA, 1970.

Myrna Burke would like to know if anyone would be interested in making a ski trip to Canada next year, about 1st March, and of approximately three weeks' duration.

Currently the return economy fare is \$900.00 and group travel (minimum 15 persons) \$630.00. The cheapest way of course is to charter an aircraft but in this case at least 150 persons would have to be interested and the fares would then work out at about the \$400.00 mark.

Working on a group travel basis - the general idea would be to fly to Vancouver and then proceed to a ski resort, say the Garibaldi area 75 miles north (with Whistler Mountain in mind particularly as it is proposed that this place should be the site of the Winter Olympics next year), or Jasper some 400 miles north east from Vancouver. The resorts close to Vancouver are "day" ones and seem to feature a number of rope tows. A visit by rail or bus to the Eastern ski areas could be included, perhaps in the Mt. Tremblant area some 80 miles north or a little closer still the Laurentians about 68 miles from Montreal.

The return to Sydney could be from Vancouver via short stop-overs in San Francisco and/or Los Angeles to take in some sightseeing.

Group rates for accommodation can be obtained, also for land transport.

Documentation; Valid Passports and Health Certificate covering Smallpox vaccination!

Travel arrangements, etc, for this trip would be organised through the Union Steam Ship Company of N.Z. Ltd. in Sydney.

It would not be necessary to spend the entire time skiing if you didn't wish to do so and one of the conditions of group travel is that all members of the party must travel together on the outward Journey to the general destination point and returning must leave the last port of call in North America together, though travel within Canada, etc., could be to your own requirements. However, to qualify for group rates there would need to be a majority of persons moving around together at the one time and staying at the same accommodation.

Anyone interested is asked to contact Myrna by letter addressed to the Club at Box 1075, G.P.O., not later than 30th July after which time, should sufficient persons be interested, firm details can be worked out.

Development in the Valley

Lifts

2 new lifts and modifications to others bring the total lifts in the valley to 15.

It is interesting to note that one of the new lifts runs from the floor of "Sun Valley" almost to the top of the chairlift. This should ease chairlift queues since the slope it services is used a great deal by chairlift riders. The other lift comes from duplexing No. 5 T-bar.

Skiing

A new "Ratrac" vehicle will be used to groom slopes after heavy falls of snow and to dig out buried lifts.

We believe day tickets for adults at "that other place" will be \$6.50 this season.

Transport Arrangements

The road has been widened in the valley and is to be kept open throughout the season. Cottrills will operate the shuttle bus service from Sawpit car park right through to terminals in the valley. Three terminals have been built to provide for the change-over to oversnow transport to and from hotels and lodges. The terminal for travellers to Warrugang is No. 3, it is located just off the main Kosciusko road between Eiger and Corroboree lodges. The terminals are said to be warm and toilet facilities are provided,

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E A S T E R 1969

Major tasks completed during the weekend were:-

Outside walls repainted.

Wood supply stacked.

Oil tanks covered over and rock wall constructed.

Drains at rear cleared and rebuilt.

Area outside lodge cleaned, rubbish removed, etc.

Max Gault has completed replacing the front roof, therefore the old blue roof is no more. The old coal-door has been replaced with a new weather-proof door and it is hoped that this will at least provide easier access when heavy drifts make the front door unusable. Max has also supplied and erected a flagpole. Reading lights were installed in the bedrooms in the new wing.

Barry Elphick has carried out repairs to the heating system and there should be an improvement in heat distribution in the lodge. The exhaust-fan in the common room should also make for more pleasant conditions.

The kitchen shelves have been rebuilt and these, with the new stove, should make working conditions better for Ruedi, as well as resulting in a much better appearance.

Many other minor tasks have been completed - leaking water system fixed, door handles repaired, broken common room windows replaced - not such a minor task as discovered by three energetic but not very practical workers (at a later weekend) who owe thanks to the timely arrival of a more practical member.

SKI PROFICIENCY TESTS

AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL SKI FEDERATION SKI COUNCIL OF NEW SOUTH WALES

GENERAL: The tests set out below are those administered by the Ski Council of New South Wales, the State controlling body of the Australian National Ski Federation (A.N.S.F.)

Ski tests are designed to encourage skiers to strive for improvement in their ability and technique and so lead to safer controlled skiing.

Candidates are invited to practise the test requirements and, when proficient, arrange for judging with a registered A.N.S.F. judge either amateur or professional (all N.P.W.S. Certified Ski Instructors are registered judges, but note rules for two judges in first and second class tests.

BADGES: Attention is drawn to the fact that A.N.S.F., i.e., those affiliated with the Ski Council of N.S.W. but individual skiers may join the Ski Club of New South Wales thus qualify for the receipt of A.N.S.F. badges.

COST: All successful tests are recorded, a fee of 50 cents is charged for a certificate and an additional 50 cents for each badge supplied, Professional judges may charge an additional fee for the testing.

SKI COUNCIL OF NEW SOUTH WALES

PRELIMINARY TEST

1. Climbing: Showing sidestep and kick turns both ways.

2. Snowplough: Demonstrating ability to control speed on a slope of 10 degrees to 15 degrees.
3. Snowplough turn to right.
4. Snowplough turn to left.
5. Stem turn to right.
6. Stem turn to left.
7. Sideslipping, facing left and right.
8. Downhill run of 100 yards: Average slope of 10 degrees without falling.

A.N.S.F. THIRD CLASS TEST

- Part A A right and left stop Christie from a speed of approximately of 6 m.p.h.
- Part B Four continuous turns, on a slope of not less than 1 in 3 (18°), or 1 part vertical, 3 parts horizontal.
- Part C Show edge and heel control by side slipping forwards and sideways, facing right and left
- Part D Demonstrate jump or hop turns to the right and left.
- Part E A no fall timed descent of at least 600 vertical feet over slopes with gradients up to 1 in 2 (27°). Gates may be used to control the standard of the test. The test may be taken in 2 descents approximately 400' vertical.

A.N.S.F. SECOND CLASS TEST

- Part A Jump or hop turns to the right and left in fast rhythm.
- Part B Parallel turns to the right and left without using stocks.
- Part C Stop turns to the right and left from a direct descent at high speed on a slope of approximately 1 in 2 (1 part vertical, 2 parts horizontal).
- Part D Four continuous linked turns on a slope of approximately 1 in 2.
- Part E Jump turns or stock turns to the right and left in soft snow on a slope of 1 in 3.
- Part F A no fall descent of 800' vertical over bumpy slopes and on untracked snow with gradients up to 1 in 2. The descent may be taken in two parts each of 400' to ensure that the candidate can ski competently and safely over a variety of terrain and on steep slopes.
- Part G A Slalom of approximately 25 gates on a descent of 400' vertical with slope up to 1 in 2. The standard of the course and timing should ensure that a successful candidate would perform competently in inter club races.

A.N.S.F. FTRST CLASS TEST

Part A Demonstrate any ski turn or control movement.

Part B Wedel in soft untracked snow on a descent of 300 to 400' vertical.

Part C Show control and racing technique through a Slalom of 25 to 50 gates on a descent of 1000 feet vertical.

The time shall be set to ensure that the skier could perform competently in a State or National racing event.

Results of performance in competition races may be taken into account before confirming the test and awarding badges.

News from Don Marshall in London, October 1969

So you want to ski Europe! After years of seeing pictures of the majestic peaks and slopes of Switzerland and Austria, who wouldn't jump at the first opportunity?

For when that opportunity comes, here is a brief run-down of the latest ski scene in this part of the world.

Of course, the first point is to be here at the right time, not as I have been in the longest, warmest summer in memory.

Before Christmas, there is reliable snow only at high resorts. Christmas and New Year all resorts are very crowded but good snow is not guaranteed; the weather is cold and there is little sun in Norway, Scotland or low Alpine valleys.

Cheaper low season rates apply in January and resorts are less crowded and there's the chance of good snow.

February and the first half of March give the best weather combination for the Alps but resorts are again crowded and rates are high.

From mid-March to mid-April, snow becomes less reliable in the Alps so high resorts with north facing slopes (they're all back to front here) are best. This is the best time to ski Norway and Scotland.

Where does an Australian tourist go? A few places have been mentioned. A recent survey here showed skiers had been to no fewer than 176 European resorts.

More than half of skiers in England go to Austria where there are many package tour holidays on offer. It's less expensive than Switzerland but no longer cheap. France has some first class ski resorts but all are expensive. Italy is less expensive but few instructors speak good English. Norway is more like Australia with a very friendly atmosphere and shorter runs and most instructors are very fluent in English.

Scotland at Aviemore has limited facilities but is quite popular even though conditions are not always good.

A new resort is being developed at Sallent in northern Spain but conditions are still primitive.

Ah'. . then Switzerland. Many well developed resorts with good hotels and very expensive.

Beginners would be best satisfied at Geilo (Norway), and Lermoos, Alpbach, Soll and Brand (Austria).

Intermediate skiers would also like these places but would be more satisfied by the longer runs at Davos (Switzerland), and St. Anton (Austria).

The advanced skier would like also Grindelwald, Verbier and Zermatt (all Switzerland).

For overall good skiing and atmosphere, Kitzbühel and St. Christoph (Austria), Courchevel (France), Salva (Italy), and Klosters and St. Moritz (Switzerland) are favoured.

To an Australian, these are so many names. But, when in England, do as the English do.

The average English skier gets to the European slopes once a year only. There are some hardy stalwarts who go by coach every weekend to Aviemore in northern Scotland.

But otherwise it's a holiday to Austria or whatever.

Package tours by air have become the rule since even when one is in Europe, it's difficult to arrange such a good deal what with the language barrier.

Eight days in Austria from England start from 23½ guineas inclusive. There's a quick flight to say Munich and then a bus trip.

You're liable to have some delays but it's still quicker and about the same price as rail or all coach.

Then there's all sorts of extras depending on what you want to do, how much gear you own and so on.

Generally, boots are hired or bought in England and clothes are best bought here too.

There's the latest plastic boots even.

Skis are best obtained in the country where you decide to go. Flexible edges are the latest development along with the American takeover of some leading makers.

Most places you are expected to wear proper ski clothing but in France you could wear your best Sunday suit and skis and no one would mind.

The lightest of timber skis and narrow plimsolls are cheapest in Norway of course.

To get into trim first is an essential but there are something like 40 artificial slopes in England, the largest 300 ft.

As in Australia, more and more people are going to ski. The average yearly increase is 30%.

So many resorts are crowded and it's not unusual to wait 15 minutes for a lift for a 2 minute run!

The trend then is to look wider afield. So Poland, Yugoslavia, the Dolomites and Eastern Europe generally are coming into favour.

The extra travel cost is saved in accommodation and other ways.

Skiers in Britain are severely restricted by the £50 a year travel allowance imposed by the Government. But there are some ways of making the most of this and the host of Travel Agents in London know all the tricks.

Booking? Would you believe that bookings for Christmas were still being taken in early October? And mid-January is easy to book in early-November, depending on where you want to go.

So all you need now is the chance to get to England ... and the money!

Then all of Europe is at your doorstep for what must be the greatest skiing in the world.

Footnote - Don had to cancel his booking at Warrugang to go overseas on a lengthy tour for his firm - it looks as if he has thoroughly investigated the snow scene, if nothing else!
