EDITORIAL

It is customary for editors to pen at least one editorial angrily denouncing the apathy of club members. The usual excuse for the tirade is a poorly-attended social function; of which there have been some this year. However, I cannot feel that lack of interest in the social side of the club's activities is of such importance, as most people, after all, join a ski club to ski.

However, I must add my comments to those of previous editors, if for other reasons. A special general meeting was called early in November to raise the annual subscription from £1 to £2 and to reduce the quorum of the Board. The necessary quorum for the meeting was 20; only 16 turned up. One or two felt strongly about one or other of the motions to be discussed, the others turned up for reasons which can be best described as "club spirit," although not feeling strongly on either issue. It seems incredible that the remaining club members were too disinterested to bother with the meeting - but very few even sent proxy forms. Further consideration of these matters has, of necessity, been postponed to the annual general meeting in 1964.

Further indications of lack of interest are to be found in the (as yet) poor response to account forms sent in December. Perhaps the possibility of loss of booking privileges will be a stimulus to more members to return their subs.

When meeting Warrugangsters I always find them to be vocal on the subjects of the hut and its comforts, the Valley and its amenities, and the administration of activities but these often critical opinions are rarely made available for discussion either by other members or by the Board. The magazine can be a forum for the exchange of ideas and for controversy; in this way interest in the club can be kept alive. If members' opinions are often the result of ignorance, then perhaps the Board itself is not making the best use of its magazine for its own publicity.

We are sorry to lose him - it will be difficult to find any replacement with all Lu's capabilities in cooking, setting slaloms, mending skis, coaching in langlauf, guitar playing and so on. However, an advertisement has appeared in the Herald for a two person cook-manager team and if club members know of suitable interested people could they please contact the secretary by the end of January.

If any members have comments to make on the general subject of management (i.e. ideas, preferably constructive, or criticisms or advice) John Davenport heads a committee on these questions and should be contacted.

The granite facing of the Warrugang basement has been started and it looks very fine, a considerable improvement on the previous cement.

Building

It is now extremely unlikely that extensions will go up this summer.

The delays have been occasioned by the Park Trust firstly because the lease documents have not been finalised and because a resurvey of our lease (now cut by the Trust's road) is necessary. However, news of some changes in the form of the lease is welcome and we hope it may now prove possible to borrow from the bank on the basis of the lease. The original document did not provide sufficient security for this but recent changes may have overcome this problem.

Ten months ago the Board sent to the Park Trust the plans for the extensions (plus the then required fee) requesting permission in principle to build. To last week the only acknowledgement of this was a request for a further building fee in December.

However, although we are very disappointed not to see progress this year, it now seems certain that all obstacles can be overcome in order to make an immediate start with the thaw late in 1964.

SOME K.S.P.T. NEWS

It is welcome news to ski tourers that a shelter hut is to be built and maintained by the Trust on Mt. Anderson in the Main Range (lying between Twynam and Tate) for the use of skiers and walkers. In two or three years also, the Conservation hut on Carruthers will revert to the Trust with the option of leaving it as a shelter hut (where it is ideally situated in an area not provided with any form of shelter) or of re-erecting it elsewhere as a shelter hut. I hope that the Trust will make the most of its opportunities and use these huts with the existing shelter and Ski Tourers huts to form a chain to provide safety for those using the Main Range.

One of the Trust's main problems is vandalism. During the busy weeks of summer the summit road is littered with bottles, cans and other debris (keeping rangers busy as garbage men) and down-going cars are loaded with specimens of the park's flora. Seaman's Hut - which continues to provide vital shelter for trapped skiers in bad weather - is a target for the destructive despoilers. It is to be hoped that similar huts reached only after considerable effort, will fare better.

SOCIAL JOTTINGS.

The Annual Dinner Dance at the Bennelong Hotel was a memorable success. A good crowd turned up, anxious to see old friends and make new ones; to relive "days on the chair" and to reminisce generally on the season just past.

Dawn and Lu from Perisher, Barbie Graham from Canberra Barry and Helen Judd from Newcastle and the Bathurst contingent (accompanied by our old friend Merv. in fine form) all travelled far and contributed to the success of the evening. We saw many faces there, too many to list by name and anyway, we don't trust the accuracy of our memory!

Presentations were made to the successful champions by the time Ron Carroll had drained all of his suitably
filled trophies (Championship, Downhill and Jump).....
We understand he was late for work the next morning.
Barbara Wigney (Ladies' Championship, Downhill and Langlauf) and Barbara Graham (Slalom) received their trophies
which were the wrong shape to drink out of. Barry Judd
and Gus Green received the trophies on behalf of Peter
McInnes (Langlauf) and David MacAlpine (Slalom).

For those who were not present, some details of the trophies follow. The names of the Championship winners have been inscribed on two shields which will hang in the lodge. Permanent trophies have been donated for the men's slalom and langlauf and the ladies' slalom. Those take the form of small trophies with skiing insignia to be held by the winners for one year. THE WARRUGANG GUIDE TO SKIING

Chapter 11

Boat Racing.

There are 2 kinds of boat race practised in the Snowy Mountains, one of them indigenous. We shall consider these 2 categories in order, one by one.

Class No. 1 boat race is an all year round sport practised by members of the skiing fraternity as an after-hours pastime. The equipment is simple and consists of any vessel with a hole in the top and no hole in the bottom. Championship Class Boat Racers use vessels with handles on them.

One also needs access to a large supply of beer. For vessels with a large draught, Toothey's Country Special Draught booze is recommended while Retch's Pilsener is quite suitable for minor events.

According to Hoyle, the vessel is filled up to the Plimsoll-collar since and the first side to empty the vessel in a specified direction wins. In practice it is advisable to provide a separate vessel (which should be inspected beforehand for hidden compartments) for each side, or else to run the race in relays from the same vessel, each side being timed during the performance.

There are generally certain rituals which must be observed. For example each competitor must begin by raising the vessel from the bar to the yard-arm and on completion of the passage he should berth the vessel and salute the barman. (The ritual is slightly different for a barmaid.)

Sides may consist of individuals or teams, but for large crews it is advisable to carry a mate who is known as the Shouter.

These races are run regularly throughout the skiing season in the establishments known as the Man, the Sindeck and the FULLR Bar. The most important regatta of the year includes races from the Perisher Cup and Pot.

Class no. 2 is a boat race in the full sense of the word and is run in Perisher Creek just once a year, usually a week or so after the ski-tourists go home. The nature of the event is adequately described in the official rules which are reprinted (without permission) below, while the craft involved may be left to the imagination.

ANNUAL REGATTA

The K.I.S.S. Club Regatta (1963) will be held on Saturday October 12th., at 3.00 p.m.

RULES

- 1. No vessel must exceed 27 ft. in length OR draw more than 4 ft. of water when the crew is loaded.
- 2. Each vessel must be made locally from materials borrowed or acquired from local sources.
- 3. Vessels must not be propelled by mechanical, physical or supernatural means.
- 4. Sails are permitted. Maximum sail area is $29\frac{1}{2}$ square feet OR twice the area of the poop deck; whichever is the greater.
- 5. Maximum number in anyone crew is 8 (men, women and boys)
- 6. Crew members are allowed to push vessel off creek bank, but must not propel vessel forward by pushing or paddling.
- 7. Entire crew must stand and salute official party at finishing line BEFORE passing under the Bridge.
- 8. Each vessel must have a name, fore or aft, whichever crosses the finishing line first.
- 9. Vessels made solely out of inflated inner tubes will not be allowed.

^{*} The K.I.S.S. club was formed to provide a social outlet for people who work in the mountains. Although the original members were mostly Perisher people the name was changed to Kosciusko in the interests of international goodwill.

10. Entries must be lodged with the Club President before 2.55 p.m. on Saturday October 12th, 1963.

Points will be deducted if..... a. the vessel falls to bits

a. the vessel falls to bits b. the vessel goes under the bridge backwards c. the crew is not suitably attired d. the crew shouts obscenities or makes improper suggestions to race officials.

The decision of the judges will be final and no objections will be heard unless accompanied by money.

EDITORIAL



Associate Membership

The Board has decided to create Associateships of Warrugang Ski Club. The aim of this move is to increase the active interest in the club and to provide a group from which future Club members can be drawn.

Associates will be bound by the rules of the Club, will pay an annual subscription well in excess of that paid by members in return for certain privileges. They will be entitled to second priority bookings, will pay a tariff a little below that paid by non-members and will receive the magazine and social notices. It is expected that the moneys to be paid will be particularly attractive to any person wanting two weeks or longer in the Club.

From the Club's viewpoint, an increase in the number of active skiers is of benefit and in particular it gives the members a chance to meet and know the Associates before they become full members as we hope many will. In addition, in future seasons any clubs accepting non-member bookings will be closely scrutinised particularly by the Park Trust as they may then become liable to be registered as commercial establishments.

It is to be hoped that a brochure will be completed in order to publicise this move; but in the meantime club members with friends interested in a skiing holiday might well interest them in this scheme. Friends to be Associates simply apply in writing to the Hon. Secretary.

1964 BOOKING REGULATIONS

1. Booking Acceptance

- (a) Bookings will be accepted only from members, associates and friends of members. Bookings will not be accepted from the general public.
- (b) Every friend of a member, not being a member, associate or spouse or child of a member or an associate who applies for a booking shall be recommended by at least one member.
- (c) Bookings will be accepted only where such vacancy as applies to the class of booking concerned occur.
- (d) Residents, whether members, associates or friends of members shall accept without reservation all regulations herein described whether explicit or implied.
- (e) The club does not undertake to keep or maintain waiting lists for weekly bookings, but, if waiting lists are kept, the names of members shall be placed above the names of associates and the names of associates shall be placed ahead of the names of friends of members.
- (f) No booking shall be accepted from any member who is in arrears with his annual subscriptions until after 15th April.
- (g) Children of members under the age of five years, children of associates under the age of ten years and children of the friends of members under the age of fifteen years shall not be accommodated during the winter season in the dormitories.

2. Booking Office

The booking office shall be at such a place as the directors shall from time to time determine.

3. Opening of Bookings.

Bookings shall be accepted for each winter season as follows:

(a) From 1st February each year: Members and their spouses and children if accom-

panying them

- (b) " : Associates 1st April
- (c) " 15th April : Spouse and children of associates Friends of members

Unfinancial members.

4. Period of Bookings

- (a) Except as provided for elsewhere in these regulations, all bookings shall be for periods consisting of whole weeks commencing and ending on a Saturday, provided that any person who satisfies the requirements of these regulations may book for a lesser period if he agrees to pay the tariff for the full period on demand.
- (b) Where accommodation for a period of less than one week is available this accommodation shall be offered at daily tariff

rates

- (c) Waiting lists for weekend bookings shall be opened on 1st February for members and on 1st April for Associates.
- (d) Weekend bookings, where available, shall be accepted from members and spouse if accompanying them and associates only, provided that each non-member so booked shall be accompanied by a member.
- (e) The available weekend accommodation shall be allotted by the booking manager two weeks before the weekend concerned. The booking manager shall advise all successful applicants immediately.
- (f) Member and associates who have $\underline{\text{not}}$ booked for a full week during the current season shall be granted preference for weekend bookings.

5. Emergency Accommodation.

- (a) The emergency accommodation shall normally be available to members and spouse accompanying them and associates <u>only</u>.
- (b) The number of persons accommodated in the emergency accommodation shall be limited to four at any one time.
- (c) any person requiring the use of emergency accommodation without booking shall be required to convince the hut manager that the circumstances constitute an emergency. If the circumstances do not constitute an emergency and no prior booking has been made, the applicant shall be refused accommodation.

6. Application and payment of booking moneys.

- (a) Each application for a weekly booking shall be made in writing and shall be accompanied by the requisite deposit, provided that the booking manager may, at his discretion, accept provisionally, a booking made by telephone. If such a telephone booking is not confirmed in writing within 48 hours and the deposit paid, the booking shall automatically lapse.
- (b) The deposit required shall be as follows:
 - i Weekly Bookings: £5 per person per week.
 - ii <u>Weekend Bookings</u>: 10/- per person per weekend at time of application.
- (c) Except as provided for in clause (d) below, all weekly bookings must be paid in full at least one calendar month before the commencing date of the booked period, otherwise the booking may be allotted to another applicant and the original deposit (less cancellation fee) shall be automatically refunded.
- (d) The requirement in clause (c) above may be waived at the discretion of the Board of Directors provided that the applicant undertakes to pay the full tariff if the booking is not cancelled and is not used.
- (e) All weekend bookings shall be paid in full within one week of the acceptance of the booking; otherwise the booking will automatically lapse and no refund of deposit money shall be made.

7. Tariffs

8. Cancellation of bookings.

- (a) All cancellations shall be notified to the booking manager
- (b) The following cancellation fees shall be charged, on the basis of the number of days notice received before the commencement of each week booked.

- (c) If no notice of cancellation is received, no refund shall be made
- (d) The schedule of cancellation fees set out in 8(b) above shall apply also to bookings transferred from one period to another.
- (e) No refund of deposit money shall be made for cancellation of any application for a weekend booking.

9. Conditions of Booking

- (a) The name and address of each person booked shall be supplied to the booking manager at the time of booking.
- (b) Bookings originally made in the name of one person may not be transferred to any other person.

10. Booking Manager.

- (a) The Board of Directors shall appoint a booking manager who shall be responsible for the administration of all bookings in accordance with the regulations.
- (b) The Board of Directors may authorise the payment of a commission to the booking manager provided that this commission shall not exceed the amount of one shilling in the pound of moneys collected by the booking manager and provided also that no commissions shall be paid to any Director of the Club.

11. Duties of the Booking Manager

The booking manager shall:-

- (a) Keep a master booking book showing the names and addresses of all persons booked for each period of the season, together with all amounts paid and owing by these persons,
- (b) Issue receipts for all booking moneys received,
- (c) Issue a separate accommodation voucher for each person booked for each holiday on payment of the full tariff due.
- (d) Keep a book of account showing a complete and detailed daily record of all money received and banked,
- (e) At least once every week, $\underline{\text{either}}$ deposit to a bank account in the name of the club all moneys received during the previous week $\underline{\text{or}}$ hand $\underline{\text{intact}}$ to the Hon. Treasurer all money received during the preceding week.
- (f) Present to the Hon. Treasurer at least once each week a detailed statement of all refunds of money owed for cancelled bookings.

- (g) Keep a proper and detailed daily record of all reclaimable out-of-pocket expenses connected with these duties and present a statement of these expenses to each meeting of the Board of Directors,
- (h) Compile and forward to the hut manager, at least one week before the commencement of each week concerned, a detailed statement showing the name, sex, bed number, amount paid, amount owing, number of accommodation voucher issued and all other relevant details for each person booked at the lodge, and forward a copy of this statement to the Hon. Secretary.
- (i) Make available for inspection, at any time, by any officer of the club, all books and records connected with these duties.

12. Special Consideration

- (a) These regulations are subject to amendment without notice at any time by a meeting of the Board of Directors.
- (b) The Board of Directors may grant exemption from any of these regulations to any individual who pleads special circumstances and, in particular, the Board may grant some or all of the privileges set down for associate members to:-
- (i) Any person who has rendered some significant service to the club ,
- (ii) Any person who wishes to stay at the lodge as the guest of the resident manager-caterer provided that such person shall be accommodated only in that part of the lodge reserved for the manager's use.

CEREBRATIONS ON CELEBRATIONS

The club is nearing its tenth birthday. Although discussed freely during 1953, the formation was sometime during 1954 and its incorporation under the Companies' Act occurred in December of that year.

I hope to be able to compile a story of the club's early activities, both in Sydney and in developing the hut. Could foundation members ring me, jot down some thoughts or even provide an article for me?

I believe also that a tenth birthday party is planned.

WEEKEND BOOKINGS

As a guide to those who wish to make weekend bookings, this is a brief explanation of the mechanism.

Weekend bookings open in February for members. Associates may go for a weekend only in company with a member, and bookings open for them in April. Deposit is 10/-These restrictions do not apply where beds are empty.

Two weeks before the weekend concerned the booking officer will allot the four weekend vacancies using as a guide the idea of preference for those who will be having no other holiday, and he will notify them immediately. If confirmation and full tariff is not received, he will then re-allocate the bed, to the next on the list. No deposit will be refunded if the booking is cancelled by the member making it; but the deposit will be returned if no vacancy occurs.

Chapter 12

THE WARRUGANG GUIDE TO SUMMER SPORTS Chapter 4

With the approach of the ski season, it is time to start considering ways of making the maximum impact in the world of snow sports. Whether you actually go skiing is immaterial; it is very "thing" to be a skier.

Firstly, clothing. When at a barbecue or party in Sydney, skiwear is essential. Bring out your stretch pants and the bulky knits - you can't start this too soon. you ever make it to the mountains, however, the real expert wears khaki pants and a Paddy green jacket. Only the novice at skimanship is caught on fashionable clothing on the snow. Club badges, preferably sewn onto unlikely places, are in, but tourist badges are definitely out.

For the really dedicated in the art, a few sessions with an ultraviolet lamp whilst wearing ski goggles is essential, and the results (measured in terms of conversation openings) are well worth the effort. Of course, to do this in January and mention casually Innsbruck or even Sun Valley is the ultimate in skimanship.

A plaster cast on an extremity (preferably a lower) adds no end of colour but this may be difficult and painful to arrange. Perhaps just attendance at a first aid class and a few bandages is a reasonable compromise, particularly if backed by X-rays, remembering that while anyone's will do, the limb and story concerned must be consistent.

One's car must have a ski rack preferably permanently mounted. Under no circumstances will the skiman permit one of those "Kosciusko" stickers on his windows, although a Snowy Mountains Authority car convoy sticker almost qualifies. More subtly, winter tread on car tyres is a must, but pennants are definitely not permissible.

Names can give the novice skiman away. Watch that the careless "Smiggs" replaces any more accurate titles. To know the surnames of ski instructors is very one-up. An occasional rude reference to the "Trust" is essential, with reference to clipper delays (for luggage only).

Bookings are now open for members and bookings for associates will open on April 1st.

Non-members who do not apply for associateships and who wish to go for a holiday at Warrugang must apply in writing for provisional membership. Bookings for provisional members open on 15th April.

WEEKEND BOOKINGS.

Weekend bookings are now open throughout the season. Members and associates accompanied by a member $\underline{\text{only}}$ are eligible. Deposit is 10/- per person per weekend.

Two weeks prior to the weekend in question the booking officer will allot the vacancies available according to a priorities list, giving preference to those who will not be haying a week's holiday. He will notify all successful weekenders whose booking will be cancelled unless confirmation and full tariff is received within a couple of days. If they cancel or let the booking lapse, he will then allot it to the next on the list and so on

Where beds are empty, there is no limit on the number who can go and use them for a weekend? (er, that is, one bed each.) Also, as in the past, it is expected that last minute applications can be made directly to the manager.

There is no refund of deposit for cancelled or lapsed weekend bookings, the exception being if the booking is unavailable.

GENERAL MEETINGS OF THE CLUB.

Several General Meetings of the Club were held on the 6th March, 1964 in Manning House at the University of Sydney. They were only just held as we only had two more than a quorum present.

Two Extraordinary Meetings were held first to make changes in 'The Articles of Association' and these resulted in the following changes being made:-

- 1. Article 14 was amended so as to increase the Annual Subscription to £2 per annum. This will take effect for 1965 Subscriptions.
- 2. Article 61 was amended so as to change the quorum for a meeting of Directors from 6 to 5. This will take effect immediately.
- 3. Article 43 was amended so as to include a provision that at least two of the retiring Directors must be re-elected at an election of Directors.

Item 1 is self explanatory - annual subs. have not been covering the general administrative costs of the Club and virtually had to be raised. Item 2 was effected primarily to overcome difficulties experienced in 1963 when Directors' illnesses caused the abandonment of at least one Directors meeting through lack of a quorum. With only 7 Directors a quorum of 6 did not provide a margin of sufficient size to cater for illnesses.

Item 3 was effected to ensure that continuity of knowledge will be carried on from one Board to the next. Quite often negotiations carry on from one Board to the next and it is essential that someone on the Board has knowledge of what has gone before to enable the negotiations or any other business to carry on without interruption.

An Extraordinary Meeting also passed a motion authorising the Directors to enter into a lease agreement with the Park Trust for a lease of the Club's Lodge site in Perisher Valley.

At the Annual General Meeting of the Club the several reports which had been previously circulated were formally presented and accepted. Each Director elaborated on particular aspects of the Club's operations and the changing situation in Perisher Valley. Motions of appreciation and congratulations to the retiring Board for a successful year were carried by acclamation.

Ian Sefton started some spirited discussion with two motions of which he had given previous notice. The first of these resurrected the question of free holidays for Directors which most Directors had considered dead and buried. However Ian wanted to re-inter it formally and this was done without dissent.

The second motion was of far more significance as far as the Club is concerned. His motion was effectively to remove our bookings from the office of Ski Sports Pty. Ltd., and to place them with Paddy Pallin. The arguments for and against could go on for some time but the time for arguing is past. Subsequent to the meeting the Directors have changed the booking office to Paddy Pallin. It now behoves EVERY member of the Club to make sure that everyone knows where the new booking office is and that the accommodation is booked out for the season. Our future extensions depend on this.

From previous issues of the Magazine everyone knows that Lu will not be back at Warrugang this Year. However the Club have been most fortunate in being able to gain the services of Ruedi and Anneke Kunz to look after us at the lodge this year. News From Barbara Wigney

(This was a letter received by Ann and Ian Sefton recently.)

I leave Austria to-morrow, so I decided I couldn't possibly procrastinate any more about writing. I feel very sad about leaving Austria (and the skiing) but spring has come and I promised I would meet my brother in North West Germany in three days.

Chris and I have spent 5 glorious weeks in Austria, mainly skiing in Kitzbuehel, but we have also visited St. Johann-in Tyrol, Saalbach, Zell-am-See, Salzburg and of course Innsbruck. Kitzbuehel tops our popularity poll - it has fantastic skiing as well as being a relatively cheap place to live. The lifts - cable cars, chairlifts and T-bars are reasonable (and safe) and the general atmosphere there is wonderful. The Kitzbuehel area is well known for its ski circuit, the cable cars and lifts are linked to give dozens of different runs to adjoining towns and VW combi buses give an excellent and cheap taxi service back. St. Johann is a lovely little town quite near Kitzbuehel. It has excellent Nursery and Intemediate slopes and is close enough to Kitz to take advantage of the more difficult runs. I was not at all impressed with Saalbach, mainly because it is purely and simply a skiing village and they didn't have much snow. At Zell-am-See we went up the cable car to the Schmittenhoehe and had a fantastic view of the Alps. The skiing was beaut - a sunny day with a few inches of powder but the snow ran out about three quarters of the way down the mountain, and we had a long walk home. The lack of snow didn't seem to worry the locals - they would just continue on the grass!

In Kitzbuehel I joined the ski school for six days, and they really tried to teach me to ski. One generally had 4 hours instruction a day but I had a keen instructor and he made us work 5 - 6 hours a day. In the morning we would have technique lessons and in the afternoon "Survival" lessons - this just meant getting down the nastiest, steepest mountain by whatever means you liked - snowplough, "wigney", Arlberg and even a few Sefton turns. I was in the top class II which covered parallel, Wedeln and Deep Snow skiing. Fortunately there was no deep snow, so I didn't kill myself. One day we did have 10" of powder and I spent most of the lesson out-of-sight - I was hopeless!

While in Kitzbuehel we saw the Junior Jumping Champion-ships. The competitors were from 10 to 17 years and the longest jump was 43 metres. It was all quite impressive. Also we saw the Racetrack (iced of course) and saw Skijoring -horse and skier racing. This was exciting - numerous falls.

There are really so many things to tell about, but thank heavens I'm running out of room - the mental stress is too much - however I shall just mention a few things -

Ski fashions are not as smart as Perisher - collar and tie and pearls often worn skiing. Little plastic boots are available to fit over plaster casts (hundreds of them!) Very short skis - just head high. Style of skiing varies even as close as Kitzbuehel and St. Johann - In Kitz I was in Class II and in St. Johann Class I. Not many Australians in Kitzbuehel, mainly Germans, Swedes, Austrian and Canadians. The Aussies, particularly Threddies head for Lech and Zurs, otherwise St. Moritz or Norway. It is far too cold for sightseeing at the moment but good weather for skiing. Lights have just blinked at the Hostel (lights out at 10 p.m.) so I just timed it nicely!

Of the many good films on in town in recent weeks the one that possibly aroused the most partisan interest was Dick Barrymore's "The White Search". Although the advance publicity in no way rivalled that of Cleopatra, I feel certain two suburban theatre managers must have thought that television sets were no longer in existence.

The whole program was good value, being entertaining and varied. As all of the instruction in the N.S.W. snowfields is based on the Austrian technique, it was interesting to watch a very well produced film by the French on their "Christiana Leger" or Light Christi. Australians, as a nationality where skiing is only a minority sport, do not perhaps realise the struggle that exists between European countries for skiing supremacy, not only in competition, but also in teaching techniques which evolve from competition.

The Austrians and French in particular have vied in this regard since the inception of modern skiing. As largely Alpine countries it is not only a matter of national prestige but a down to earth matter of economics based on tourism and the export of ski equipment. The feature film concentrated mostly on the Austrian technique, so that the two films allowed one to compare the merits of each system.

The White Search was based on a very 'tongue-in-cheek' account of the exploits of a legendary "Lawrence of Beverley Hills" and his search for better snow. The camera roamed through Austria, Alaska, Chile, Aspen and Alta in the States and the Australian areas of Thredbo and Falls Creek. It was perhaps disappointing to a Warrugangster not to see a sequence from Perisher, but at least it was refreshing to know that Australia bas received some recognition as a skiing nation.

Several highlights of the film were sequences showing deep powder skiing in Aspen and Alta. The altitude and weather combine to present these areas with very light, deep powder snow and it was rather breathtaking to watch experts bounce waist deep down these trails leaving a plume of powder behind them like the wake of a hopped-up speedboat.

The spectacular Stein Eriksen was one of the stars and later in the Chilean sequence Dick Barrymore showed us the artistry on moguls of Othmar Schneider. These two champions, who each won Gold medals in the 1952 Winter Olympics, have established themselves over the years as perhaps the top names in the ski world. Anyone who was fortunate enough to see Stein Eriksen when he visited Australia in 1962 will realise that this recognition is not misplaced. I well remember seeing him ski down Perisher Bowl demonstrating his brand of mambo and it was without a doubt the most stylish exhibition of swinging skiing that one is ever likely to witness.

No film is without some criticism and in this case I feel that it possibly could be attributed to a trace of monotony, particularly if the viewer is not an avid skier. Also I found that I could not help comparing this film with those shown last year, particularly the two Warren Miller shows. Humour is used quite extensively by both photographers but I must admit that I was more impressed with Miller's humour and presentation.

The latter comment is one of purely personal taste though, and should not detract from the obvious appeal this film has had - and will continue to have - with the skiing fraternity. It only had a limited run in Sydney but will probably be shown at Perisher or Smiggins, so if you have not seen it and have an opportunity to do so, then don't miss it.

SCHEME - ANSHIP

Now that the first cool breath of Autumn has tickled us with its chilly fingers, making us think in terms of Scotches not schooners; the first catalogues of ski equipment have arrived, and we're catching our breath from a "White Search" with Dick Barrymore, we realise that the ski season is almost here. Vague thoughts of fitness and training must now become action and reality. For those who have had several seasons already, this sort of thing will have become something of a conditioned reflex, but for those who are newcomers to skiing, then it is high time you commenced your training, not only in a physical tune-up, but more important, in the demanding technique of "self-elevation", which properly performed, will command the accolade, usually reserved for a flawless Wedeln, the length of the 'Chair'.

An excellent example of what I mean may be demonstrated by our old friend Bob Devil (schuss-boomer supreme) who you will remember from his adventures as a ski patrolman.

1964 AMBULANCE SERVICE

For some years past, the Cooma District Ambulance Service has been providing ambulance facilities of a high standard to the Perisher area and for the past two years have had an ambulance stationed at Smiggin Holes at week-ends, with two ambulances at Jindabyne during the week.

This service has been quite uneconomical for the Ambulance Service who estimate that they lost over £2000 on this facility in 1963. Attempts have been made to rectify this situation, but with little success. The Ambulance Committee have very reluctantly therefore, been forced to curtail the service to the Snowfields.

This is a terrible situation to have no ambulance readily available in the time of need. Of course nobody likes to see accidents, but they do happen, and when they are least expected. When they do occur facilities should be on hand to ease the pain and discomfort of the unfortunate victims by providing proper transport to the nearest hospital. To this end the member clubs of the Perisher Ski Association have voluntarily elected to contribute to the Cooma District Ambulance Service on the basis of 3/- per occupied bed per week for ambulance services for all persons staying at their lodges or in transit in the Cooma District Ambulance area. Your Club is an active supporter of this scheme and will be a contributor on this basis. However as the proposal was made too late for it to be included in the rates of accomodation, it is intended that all residents at the lodge will be asked to contribute on the basis of 3/- for each week of their stay.

To some this may appear an imposition but remember how little this really is! It represents a little over half the cost of one bottle of beer at Perisher bar prices. How many bottles of beer do you drink? It is a small price to pay for the advantages it bestows. And who knows you may need the ambulance this year -- if not you , then someone else will.

Residents may elect if they wish to contribute direct to the Ambulance Service by becoming a quarterly subscriber for 10/- per family group.

SPORTS COMMITTEE NOTES

June Derby

Here's hoping that this year there will be good snow for the June long week-end. Providing skiing conditions are satisfactory, the June Derby will again be held, but with a difference. It has been decided to investigate the possibility of running the weekly races on a handicap basis and to use the June Derby as a trial for this system.

Weekly Races

This year, unfortunately, we will not have Lu to set our courses and this responsibility will rest on individual club members nominated by this committee. I feel confident that we have learnt enough to be able to have races in which we can have lots of fun even if the courses are not up to the standard of the last two years.

As previously, the weekly races will be decided on the aggregate of two runs. This year, however, the time will probably be adjusted according to the handicap. Needless to say the idea is to give every competitor a chance of winning, whilst the main aim remains to enjoy the races.

Annual Championship

It is hoped that the Annual Championship will again be a highlight of the season. This year they are being held three weeks prior to the October long week-end to give all members an opportunity to compete.

The championship events will be the same as last year namely:- Ladies: Grand Champion, Slalom, Downhill, Langlauf.
Men: Grand Champion, Slalom, Downhill, Langlauf, Jump.

The committee has decided to make some changes in the point scoring for the Championship. The most important change is that the Langlauf event will not be included in the Grand Championship. This decision was made after a lot of thought and with some misgivings, as the committee unanimously feel that club members should be encouraged to compete in the Langlauf and to do some langlauf touring. However it is impossible to hold this event over the Championship week-end which would be the only way to make conditions equal for all participants.

As far as the individual langlauf championship event is concerned, it will be decided on the same basis as last year. That is, the event may be run at any time during the season. Competitors may have as many practise runs as they like but only one official run which must be timed by a club member and the result forwarded to K. Green 24 The Crescent, Lane Cove. The course is to be revised to give less traversing, but will be approximately the same length as last year. It will be set during the June long week-end and displayed in the Lodge for the remainder of the season.

The other important change in the Grand Championship events is the allocation of points. It has been decided that the first ten places should gain points, as it was noticeable that last year some skiers were consistently placed 7th or 8th and received no points, whilst others scored high points in one particular event and performed poorly in others.

The new points system is as follows :-

Place: 1st 2nd 3rd 4th 5th 6th 7th 8th 9th 10th

Points: 15 12 10 8 7 6 5 4 3

All other competitors who complete the course without being disqualified will receive one point.



Note for Weekend Skiers.

This is to apply for each run. Once again, the events are to be decided on the total of two runs - thus, a Class 2 Skier would have 20 seconds (at the discretion of the captain) added to each of his runs.

A new langlauf course has been set in which there is less traversing than the course set last year - so let's all have a go at it.

It should be noted that the Club Championships are only open to full financial members of the club i.e. non-members and associated members are not eliqible.



WE'LL REMEMBER '64

Every now and again we are confronted by a freak sequence of events which causes us to realise that even in this day and age of modern transport and every convenience imaginable, we can still become entirely at the mercy of the elements.

Some people have attempted to predict cycles of heavy snow-falls. Some look for similarity with associated weather conditions in the Northern Hemisphere, etc.. Whatever the method, no person could have predicted the quantity of snow that fell in the second and third weeks of July.

You will have read elsewhere in the magazine Ken's description of the weather in "Boys' Week", also, in the national press, of persons and cattle being lost in the mountains.

Hank Beaverstock has given us a wealth of pertinent details which will give members who cannot get into the area this year an idea of just how much snow has fallen. It will also give the older members, who remember 1956 so well, some comparisons to talk over in the years to come.

Snow has been falling consistently in the area since the last week in May, but on Saturday the 11th of July, the blizzard really set in and some idea of how much snow fell can be gauged from a progress report of one member's car parked at Smiggs for the week:

By Thursday - the snow came up to the windows.

By Saturday - the snow was up to the roof.

All transport services virtually ceased on Sunday and the road became impassable from Sponars Inn. It was the following Thursday before services were resumed again.

Many of the 'week-enders' became stuck of course, and in not a few cases were broke! The various lodges accommodated them but, the combined effect of full lodges and no fresh supplies of food coming in, caused a few hardships.

To add to the privation, the power into the valley failed on Sunday night and for the all-electric lodges, this meant no heat or cooking. Fortunately, Warrugang is old fashioned in this regard. The snow had piled up so heavily around the club, that a tunnel was built to the wood pile so that the fire could be kept going.

Those in Sydney who tried to get in touch with people staying in the valley, soon found that the phones too were out of action, the weight of the snow caused most of the trouble, but in Warrugang's case, the snow had become so deep, that, when the Nodwell came up past the club, it fouled the overhead line.

What were the people in the valley doing during the blizzard ?? To go out meant being half blinded by snow, even though the snow was good as far as skiing conditions go. Lodge life became routine and boring with a state of suspended animation between meals. People played cards, read, slept, talked, argued and DRANK. For the most part, predicted weeks grog supplies vanished under the consistent assaults. We heard of one case where a further thirty odd pounds worth of grog was added to the stock, only to be consumed that night! Parties of course flourished, and even though outside conditions were so bad, people were prepared to brave the elements, if only to got away from the monotony of being stuck in the same surroundings.

Eventually, the snow eased, but didn't really cease, for after a little fine weather, the snow resumed, although not with the same force. The valley began to dig itself out. Technology had all but disappeared. Our own club lost the outer front door in the blow and a tunnel went out. At the back of the club, the snow formed an even line from the slope to the ridge in the roof, and this was the case for many of the huts on our side. Of the thirteen tows only two were able to operate. The chair-lift looks like being out of action with the top station and chairs resting on the snow. Not so deep, you say? Not until you realise that the cable, when loaded, sags 12 feet, and then there is normally at least a 10 foot clearance underneath!

Many of the other tows took on the appearance of going straight into the hill and it looks as though quite a few weeks will go by before they are ready for use again.

Saturday turned out to be chaotic as might be expected. The blizzard had eased, but with the people trying to get out, others trying to get in, and the road blocked, the situation was hopeless. One member arrived at Sponars Inn on the way up at 6.00 a.m., waited all day and finally arrived into the club at 8.30 p.m.. Stalwarts like Hank Beaverstock skied in, others walked, but they were the exceptions rather than the rule.

Now the picture looks a little more rosy. The roads are open to Smiggs although only for buses, and with this amount of snow dumped on the mountains, skiing is assured until Christmas.

I think with all justification that - we'll remember '64 !!

A Night in the Snow:

A number of Warrugang members spent a week's skiing in the main range and stayed at Lake Albina Lodge.

The Bathurst crew together with Lu Vozab went in on Friday, August 3 in reasonably good weather. The others were to go in on Saturday from Thredbo, with the exception of Ron Carroll, who was going in from Perisher.

As it happened, the weather was so bad at Thredbo that the Seftons did not arrive at Lake Albina Lodge until Tuesday.

DIARY Week 22nd - 29th August 1964.

During the week 22nd - 29th August the atmosphere was very quiet, no doubt because of the exhausted mental and physical state of the, majority of the guests and the fact that almost everyone had no trouble at all getting to Warrugang. Contrary to usual practice, transport ran to timetable - those going in the previous week were not so lucky! - and this fact nearly proved the undoing of one traveller whose plane did not touch down at Mascot until 8 p.m. and her taxi dropped her at the railway station three minutes after the train was scheduled to depart, however, the authorities must have known that people count on trains departing well and truly behind schedule and those three minutes just saved the situation.

One guest, not being prepared for the new mode of entry to the hut, completely missed the tunnel and wandered from Lodge to Lodge knocking on windows pleading for directions though in all but one case the "inmates" took fright at the figure outside in the snow and pulled the curtains — prowlers!! Luckily our good friend Murphy came to the rescue and escorted the lady to the haven of comfort which is our hut whereupon she vowed never again to be caught in the predicament of not knowing how to find the front door.

We were unlucky to have two days of rain during our stay but for the remainder of the week we were favoured with reasonable weather conditions which was a vast improvement on last years efforts.

The disadvantages accruing from too much snow meant that the areas being served by T-bars were like Pitt Street on a Friday and crashes and head-on collisions were numerous as a result. In fact, you were in a state of continual fear and apprehension in case you would be the next victim, unless, of course, you were a soulless devil who cared neither for life or limb. The author and another skier collided nose to nose, but ever so gently, one afternoon and each profusely apologised, though this was not always the case in other encounters.

At night we were regaled by mouse stories from Rosemary Davies whose husband John kept reminding her she said too much too often! Bill Reichel was also a resident for this week but we couldn't manage to repeat his tall stories from last year's successful airing.

This week will most probably be remembered as the one with the quietest party that Warrugang has ever held. We only had a few personal guests and over an excellent brew of Ruedi's gluhwein, talked for hours and hours.

The weekly races were held as usual with all residents taking part except Gwen Lawrence who did a sterling job with the stop watch.

A Few Thoughts on 1964 Season.

These disconnected meanderings and accounts of episodes stem from the experiences of one weekend and ten days spent in various areas of the mountains this winter.

Transport

Before making that holiday trip to the Perisher Valley it will become necessary in future to equip oneself with a stout pair of walking boots, a snowcat or a helicopter. The stories of sixteen hour delays when the road was closed to Sponars are well known from newspaper publicity - the general chaos, the lack of adequate information to passengers and the absence of any facilities (especially food). Not enough snow vehicles capable of handling the conditions were available.

Much less excusably, when the road was open to Smiggin Holes conditions were little better. Passengers arriving early at Sawpit Creek were kept waiting for long periods; a queue system (numbered tickets) was instituted but too often only after fifty or sixty people were milling around the shed which holds about a dozen. We arrived shortly after 6 a.m. one Saturday and we left only at about 9.30 or 10 a.m.; to reach Warrugang ravenous and in nice time for lunch (we walked from Smiggs). This is a big hole out of a weekend.

When the system of parking below the snowline and catching buses works it is efficiently very easy; but a much larger fleet is required than is available at present especially during peak times.

August 8th - 15th (plus 3 days)

We had planned a week's skiing at Albina. Arrival at Thredbo on a blizzardly Saturday made it obvious that we should spend some time there rather than in the main range. There were 7 1n the party.

This is obviously Thredbo's year: deep snow to the foot of the chairlift means that it can be utilised as was intended but as it has rarely, if ever, been. It was even possible for us to ski through the village itself! The slopes are long and spectacular - not much use though for two of us with only langlauf skis.

For three days we watched as feet of new snow built up, then we set out on a moderately miserable Tuesday. The trip in was made memorable by our unexpected climb high on Ethridge when we missed Seaman's hut in the poor visibility, and by the uncanny experiences of skiing quite blindly in the mist - "the whole hillside's moving."

However the sight of three Bathurst faces greeting our arrival at Albina was welcome and we soon heard the story of Bib and the "pour les girls" bucket, of the valiant but heavily laden provisioning trip in, and of Warren's blisters in a noble cause.

The one really good day of the week (weatherwise) would have convinced any sceptics of the joys of main range skiing as a motley group chugged uphill and slid down in a variety of styles from expert Vozab parallels to Arlberg to reverse shoulder sometimes) to snowplough to schuss (on skis and on various anatomical features).

Even in bad weather there was Northcote and the Slalom flags \dots again the same variety of styles was evident as bodies disappeared downwards into the gloom. And then there was always scrabble and Solo $\bullet \bullet \bullet$

The trip out was enlivened by a refreshment stop at Chalet where the burial of a poma under 15 ft. of snow should have prepared us for the sights of the snow at Perisher. But we were astounded to see Warrugang disappeared all but the roof, the impressive cornices in the Perisher and Back Perisher, and T-bars and the chairlift buried.

We were also greeted there with the story of "Brass Monkey" Ron Carroll and his epic night in the snow on his unsuccessful bed for the Main Range.

The aspect of this monster season is thoroughly pleasing; at least we shan't have to hear any more about the wonder year of 1956 which has at last been surpassed.

As mentioned above Rajah won the Championship with Len Reed 2nd and last year's champion Ron Carroll 3rd.


